

Magnolia

As an ancient plant, *Magnolia spp.* has persisted on earth for millions of years. Most **magnolia** are naturally found throughout Asia and Central America, attracting **beetles as pollinators**. Many species have been crossed to produce the best characteristics of **flower color, disease resistance and cold hardiness**. In general, magnolia **do not tolerate** poor-draining soils or too much shade. The following cultivars of magnolia are cold hardy for our zone and produce flowers in spring, with some reblooming in summer. Ask one of our nursery staff for guidance if you need help picking the right tree for your garden!
